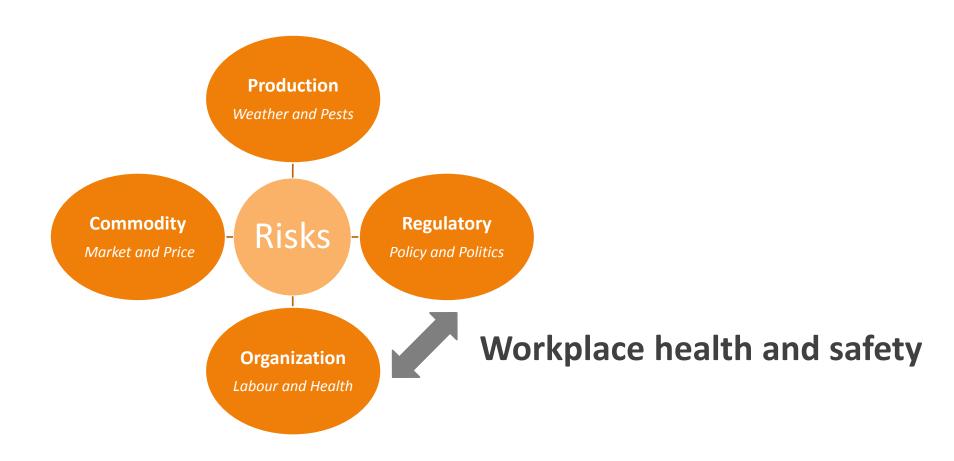

Queensland Rugby league legend Shane Webcke put his promising football career on hold in 1994 when his dad died in a workplace incident.

"I have every confidence that my father should not have died on that day.... the machines weren't looked after and they weren't maintained properly."

Statistics show the risk is real and it's not being managed effectively

Safework Australia state the agricultural sector only employ 2.6% of Australia's workforce but account a for a staggering 24% of total worker fatalities.

Agriculture has an average of 48 worker fatalities per year with 32 already counted in Jan-Jun 2017.

Agriculture and transport have been singled out by the government as the two industries requiring greater safety focus.

ABARE estimates less than 1% of Australian agribusinesses (normally large corporates) meet compliance requirements.



The Workplace Health and Safety Act outlines compliance requirements

Under the Act, you must

Provide a working environment that is safe and without risk to health

Provide plant, structures and systems of work that are safe and do not pose risks

Ensure plant, machinery, structures, substances and chemicals are used, handled, stored and transported safely

Provide adequate facilities for your workers' welfare

Provide adequate information, instruction, training or supervision for workers

Provide adequate consultation with your workers on health and safety matters

Monitor the health of your workers and the conditions of your workplace



Record keeping is essential to demonstrate compliance in operating a safe system of work

Under the Act, you must maintain

Records identifying the Person(s) Conducting a Business or Undertaking (PCBU), Worker(s) and Contractor(s)

Health and training records

Induction records

Maintenance records and safe operation rules

Hazard Analysis (records of risks/hazards identified)

Records of communication about identified risks and resolutions

Safety Policies

An emergency plan



Breach of duties under the Act is a criminal offence and penalties apply

Having a safe system of work reduces your penalty risk and reduces the likelihood of injury

Notice

A prohibition, improvement or penalty notice is issued instead of prosecution

Enforceable Undertaking

Enforceable undertakings are carried out as an alternative to prosecution through the courts (except for category 1 offences)

Prosecution

Legal prosecutions are carried out against individuals, employers or businesses who have broken WHS law



Penalties notices may be issued for any breach of duty under the Act

General Risk & Workplace Management

\$30,000 - Duty to provide information, training and instruction

\$30,000 - Duty to prepare, maintain and implement an emergency plan

\$30,000 - Duty to instruct in use and provide PPE and induct to use

\$30,000 - Duty to manage risk of isolated workers, provide a system of communication

\$30,000 - Duty to provide access to First Aid equipment

\$30,000 - Duty to provide trained First Aid person

Hazardous Work

\$30,000 - Exposure to hearing loss associated with noise

\$30,000 - Confined Spaces (appropriate training)

\$30,000 - Confined Spaces (entry permit)

\$18,000 - Confined Spaces (appropriate signage while working)

\$30,000 - Confined Spaces (guaranteed communication)

\$30,000 - Working at heights/falls, appropriate training

\$18,000 - Testing and Tagging

Ann McGrath – Victorian horse trainer and dairy farmer

Australian farmer, Ann McGrath, has suffered more than emotional strain when losing an employee on her horse training farm in a fatal quadbike accident.

McGrath pled guilty to not having policies and procedures in place, as a result she was fined \$250,000, paid over \$1 million in legal fees and had to sell property in order to pay the costs. Source: ABC Landline

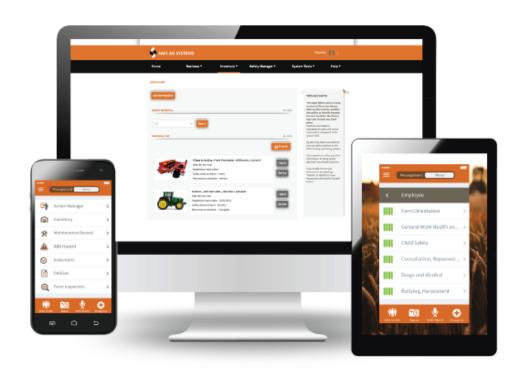
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
